What is the number one rule of the internet? Answer: don't read the comments. This week I ventured into rule breaking territory—I made a comment on a social media post, and have been in a fairly respectful conversation since. The conversation centres around a particular author—Rob Bell—and how his penchant for asking questions was now becoming, at best, unhelpful and, at worst, veering into heterodoxy (at odds with the orthodox, biblical position).

My conversation partner raised a good point—that Bell was asking deep questions that everyone else was afraid to ask. That's a fair point. Bell is very good at that. The problem is where Bell ends up with his answers—usually not giving one, and usually in a way which fundamentally detracts from the gospel.

The conversation itself raised some good points of reflection, chief among which was how we should be asking questions of the Bible. There's something to learn from Bell—both positively and negatively.

First, be encouraged to remember that God invites and welcomes hard questions to be asked. The prophets often do this, and Job as well demonstrate for us the types of questions that God welcomes. He welcomes them because he is in an authentic relationship with his people.

Second, while God welcomes questions there is a manner in which we are to ask them. When Job finally meets God he repents—not of asking his questions (since God himself says that Job has spoken rightly of him—cf Job 42:7), but of the manner in which he asked those questions. Job's questions verged on accusing God of injustice and questioning his character. Our questions need to be raised with a great deal of humility and reverence towards God.

Third, and this point is learned from the negative example of Bell, when we ask our questions we need to be open to the answer. Bell has a consistent habit of asking hard questions, but not looking to what the Bible, the gospel, or how the traditional orthodox position actually responds. Don't close yourself off from the start of your question.

Fourth, when we ask our questions we need to be careful not require a standard of proof beyond what is reasonable. Particularly when we have questions of faith that rise from doubts, we need to be open and engage with the answers that scripture and other books give us. If we expect a level of evidence beyond what can be reasonably produced then we set up the bible, and ourselves, for failure.

Let's ask questions, yes, and do so with humility, in faith, and together as a community encouraging each other.
